# History Of The Franklin County Conservation District 1941 - 1991


Conservation Districts had their beginning in the 1930's when Congress, in response to national concerns over mounting erosion and dust storms, enacted the Soil Conservation Act of 1935. The conservation district concept was developed to enlist the cooperation of landowners and occupiers in carrying out the programs authorized by the act.



To encourage local participation in the program, President Roosevelt sent all state agencies a State Soil Conservation District Law. By the late 1940's all states had adopted similar legislation.


Forming a conservation district for Franklin County was not a readily accepted idea or an easy task. Five men who had the insight and felt there was a need to conserve the land took up the challenge. These five men were: Leslie Hunter, Harry Funk, Chester Wagner, Harry Scott and H.M. Ward.

Many meetings and three elections were held before the patrons of Franklin County passed the resolution to form the conservation district. The official charter was signed on April 25, 1941 making it the 14th district to be formed in the state of Kansas. The Cooperative Extension Service played a key role in organizing and assisting the new districts.

Each district has a governing body of five board of supervisors who are elected by local occupiers and serve three year terms. They share their experience and knowledge of community needs to guide the district in setting goals and priorities for carrying out resource conservation programs. Those who have served the district as supervisors (other than the original board mentioned) were: C.B. Coughenour, Cecil H. Vining, Dean Martin, Donald Steward, Lawrence Murphy, H.H. Van Horn, Joe McAuliffe, Bernard Fischer, Art Rockhold, Vic Warren, Leon Freese, Dale Van Horn, Ed Horstick, David Nelson, Arlon Jones, Darrell Macy, Lloyd Nelson and Andy Duffle. The present board members are Albert Dunbar, J. Harry Peckham, Clayton Watts, Roland Bromert and Karl Eisele.

Leslie Hunter served the local board for 34 years as chairman and served as president of the Kansas Association of Conservation Districts (KACD) in 1960. He also serves on the Marais des Cygnes Drainage District board and has served on the ASC Committee. Albert Dunbar has also served on the conservation district board for 30 years serving as chairman for six years and representing the board on the RC&D Council, Franklin City County Planning Commission and by attending many of the KACD and NACD Conventions.

Landowners signed Farmer-District Cooperative Agreements in which the district would agree to assist the farmer in formulating a conservation plan and would provide assistance with information and technical assistance to carry out the plans. The farmer would agree to carry out the provisions of the plan and agree to maintain all structures established according to the plan. The first agreement was signed by Paul Howell, RR 2, Ottawa, on November 4, 1941, which is still an active agreement. Over the years, there have been 2,217 cooperative agreements signed with the district.

The original concept of the district in regard to financial support was that they would meet administrative expenses from monies to be appropriated by state and local governments, but as conservation problems became more complex it became increasing clear the responsibility of coordination became more difficult. At first, few districts had staff to assist the supervisors in their many tasks. Minutes of June 1955 indicated actions were taken to approach county commissioners for the purpose of obtaining an allotment to hire a part time secretary. The county commissioners did allow a "clerical fund" so the board hired Adeline Scott as a part time stenographer. Others who have served the district, in this capacity, were Betty Murray, Emily Kirkpatrick, Jo Ross, Bonnie Evans, Jacquelyn Smith, Pauline Willford and the present District Administrator, Phyllis Rossman.

But in 1963 funds for operations apparently did not cover expenses so a bank loan of \$500.00 was secured with the endorsement of the supervisors to make ends meet until the 1964 funds were made available. In early 1964 a motion was

made to prepare a budget to present to county commissioners for additional funding. In 1965 it was also recorded that state matching funds in the amount of \$2,500.00 was received meaning the district was now funded by county and state monies.

The district has also maintained an activity or enterprise fund through the sale of marking flags, grass seed, pipe and at one time drill and planter rental. This fund is used to pay for activities that are not allowable under the Operations fund and to supplement the Operations fund. Without these funds it would not have been possible for the district to meet the demands of the Food Security Act (FSA) and to facilitate the purchase of the necessary office automation and field equipment necessary to carry out the provisions of FSA and Conservation Reserve Programs (CRP).

The district has participated in implementing federal resource programs by cooperating with the USDA through its various agencies including the Soil Conservation Service (SCS). SCS provides technical assistance pursuant to a Memo of Understanding signed with the district which also includes a gratuitous benefit letter. This work includes planning assistance in the application and maintenance of conservation practices and other conservation practices needed to protect land and resources. The first Work Unit Conservationists to serve the county was Harold Stevens. Other District Conservationists were Henry Schmitz, Robert Dean, Irvin Ross, Earl Wier, Charles Weickert, Cleveland Grayson, Gary Rader and present District Conservationist, Herman Norwood. Lelan Davis served the district for many years as a Conservation Technician from 1948 - 1977 followed by Jim Human, Lee Whaley, Art Meloche and the present technician Kent Scott. Cecil E. (Gene) Vining also works as a part time technician.


Accomplishments or conservation work completed over the 50 years include 17,348,164 lf. or 3,285 mi. of terraces, 4,654 acres of waterways, 1,578 ponds and 6,405 acres have been seeded to Pasture/Hayland under the Conservation Reserve Program and conservation management practices such as cropping rotation, conservation tillage and contour farming.



Cooperator cultivating corn on the contour in unterraced field in 1936.




Strip cropping in unterraced field - 1937.

Districts also work closely with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), the Extension Service, Kansas Wildlife and Parks and Farmers Home Administration. A board member also serves on the Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) board, Franklin City County Planning Commission and provides assistance to Pottawatomie Creek Watershed, Tauy Creek Watershed and Marais des Cygnes Drainage District. Also they often coordinate projects with private sector groups including environmental and conservation organizations.




Contractor dressing top and front slope of dam on Tauy Creek Watershed.

In carrying out their overall resource management programs, the district has engaged in a variety of activities. These include programs for education, wildlife habitat protection and youth activities. The poster, limerick and essay contest for county youth has been a part of the education programs since 1948. 
According to board minutes of 1951, tape recordings with district cooperators were made on the farm and used every Saturday at 12:15 on the local radio stations. In 1952 demonstration plots were developed with plantings of multiflora rose, native grasses and birdsfoot treefoil. Other educational activities have included teacher workshops, Soil Stewardship tours for ministers, contractor meetings and native grass tours. Scholarships have also been provided for teachers to attend Ag in the Classroom sessions through Kansas State, Environmental Education classes through Emporia State and to youth for Range Youth Camp and Discovery Days.

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The Kansas Bankers' Association Awards program has been a part of the district annual meetings since 1945. Each fall the cooperating agencies work with the conservation district supervisors in selecting the farms to be recognized. The key bankers of Franklin County, as well as, the Extension agent, Chairman of the Extension Council, Chairman of the Conservation District and the District Conservationist tour farms who have been nominated for recognition. Since the inception of the program 180 Franklin County farmers have been recognized for their progress in conservation farming under this program. Four Wildlife Conservation awards have also been presented, the first of these awards being in 1980. A major contribution to the success of the annual meeting has been the meals provided by the Franklin County Bankers Association. At first the meals were provided jointly by the bankers and the Ottawa Chamber of Commerce.

Many changes directly affecting conservation districts have had a significant impact on these new roles. The district role has changed from that of a follower to one of being a leader in local planning and resource conservation programs. The board of supervisors and staff, have in the past year, attended a Board Development Workshop to try and respond to their new role and insure effective leadership and to handle the tasks that lie ahead.

Foreseeable concerns of conservation of natural resources and protection of the environment include the quality and quantity of water, chemical management and preservation of wetlands, grasslands and prime agricultural land.

By developing strong leadership skills, we hope to look ahead toward greater accomplishments in the future as we pursue our goal of the conservation and wise use of our soil and water resources.
